Sunflower Field



ONE PERSPECTIVE SUNFLOWER FIELD

1. To activate your students' schema, show the class one-point perspective photos of sunflower fields we have included and discuss the things they notice. Be sure to point out that the sunflowers closest to the camera are larger, and the sunflowers farther away are smaller - this is called one-point perspective.
2. Define one point perspective as 'A drawing method that shows how things appear to get smaller as they get further away, moving towards a single 'vanishing point' on the horizon line.'
3. Next, pass out the blank white pages to each of your students, and then have your students start drawing their largest sunflowers closest to the bottom of the page. They can continue to draw their sunflowers smaller and smaller as they move up the page.
4. Your students will want to designate their horizon line before they get too far up the page.
5. Once they have finished drawing all of their sunflowers, they can start to color them using colored pencils.

*This project can be broken into two days - one for drawing and one for coloring.

Time

- 25 Minutes Drawing Sunflowers
- 25 Minutes Coloring Sunflowers
